MY DEAR PEOPLE,

It was very gratifying to have a marked improvement in the number of communicants and in the size of the congregations generally on Whit-Sunday. During this month the centenary of the Oxford Movement will have a special place of commemora-

tion in the Dioceses and Churches throughout England. The Official Commemoration by our Diocese will be at evensong on Sunday, July 9th, at 3.15 p.m., when the Preacher will be the Lord Bishop of London. As far as we are concerned in this Parish, we shall offer our Thanksgiving for the Revival of Church Life at all the Services, and our special intention at the seven and eight o'clock communions will be for Peace and Unity in the Church. Let us all come to the services on that day in a spirit of penitence for the unhappy divisions which exist in the Church, and with a determination that by the Grace of God we will do all we can by prayer and in a spirit of fellowship and love one to another, to heal the divisions which
