Another matter which I feel should have a greater place in the thoughts and interests of many more of the congregation is the work of the Church overseas. We have our Missionary Association which binds many of us together in prayer and study and I hope that we shall have some new members, specially from among the young people in the very near future. Much of our lack of interest in this most important part of the Church's work is due to ignorance, and there is no excuse for ignorance because we have a Missionary Library in the Baptistry full of books which give the latest information about the Missionary work of the Church. I do hope that these books will be much more used than of late and I feel sure that when you have gained the information they can give, you will become interested in what the Church is doing to fulfil our Lord's command to preach the Gospel to every creature. Remember no true follower of Jesus Christ can neglect His command. I have thought a good deal just lately about the excuse that many make for not praying for and helping missions overseas—that there are so many heathen in our midst. As I watched the thousands on the beach, or strolling up and down the promenade, the vast majority of whom never go into a place of worship, perhaps never say their prayers or give a moment to God and eternal things, my first thought was that there might be something in the excuse after all. And yet the majority of those people have been baptized and in their young days most probably went to Sunday School. In fact they have had their opportunity and have willingly let it slip by, while those in other lands have not had their opportunity and who are we that we should withhold it when the Saviour definitely lays the responsibility upon us? Let us have done with excuses and put our minds and energies to furthering the cause of missions overseas in the parish.

Now with regard to winter work of a more social

character. The Social Committee have, I know, booked the Hall for various dates during the season. They will run socials and dances. The first social will take place this month and I hope that all will support it and come and enjoy a jolly evening together. I am hoping that Whist-drives and possibly Bridge-drives may feature amongst the social events. Of course all these events have one aim in view viz. to help increase the parochial funds. I do want to pay our Diocesan Quota this year so please support all schemes for raising money as well as you are able.

As you will see further on we want more helpers for some of our organisations. One or two teachers for the Boys' Sunday School and at least one for the girls are really essential to the efficiency of the Sunday School as a whole. I should be very glad to have offers for this work.

Finally let us strive earnestly for a greater family spirit amongst us. We all can add our bit to the life of the parish, there is something that each can do. If only we would do it what a happy community we should be!
