Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

How time does rush along! This year there will be little space for breathing between the round of Christmas Festival and feasting and the disciplinary season of Lent. Just when I wanted to be busy preparing the services and preachers for Lent I have been confined to my room with a temperature for a whole week. However, I am just up for a while and am spending the time addressing these few lines to you. I hope in due course to be able to arrange a programme of Lenten Services at convenient times for all and which will be of spiritual help to all. There

is perhaps more need than ever for a particularly strict keeping of the Lenten Fast especially by those, who for a better word, are called the Faithful. Religion is exercising the minds of many to-day and much is written about the Christian Church not only here but in other countries. The Church is the generator of that wonderful Christian atmosphere in which a vast number of people live and thrive, partaking of all the Beneficence which Christianity gives out to them, but doing little to continue the generation of that atmosphere of Christian Religion in which only is it possible for such good things to be given to mankind. Mothers' Union.

The mothers had a very jolly afternoon on the first Wednesday in the New Year. For an hour before tea they were entertained and entertained themselves with the best known of the community songs. Of the four or five different books with or without music and sheets of words only, all differed in the numbering of the songs or in the words, but this only added to the fun—it does sound funny, to hear various people putting varied words to what all believed to be such a song as "Home Sweet Home" for example. A very appetising tea was served at four o'clock to which fair justice was done and after tea two exciting games were played, each one a competition which carried with it a prize for the winner. The meeting broke up at six o'clock after a hearty vote of thanks had been accorded to Mrs. Harvey for an enjoyable time.

The Monthly Meeting will be held on Wednesday, February 7th, at 2.30 p.m. Mrs. Fry is coming to speak to the members and Mrs. Harvey hopes a number will be able to be present.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held in the Parish Hall, on Thursday, January 18th. The Vicar presided and there were less than a sixth of the number on the Electoral Roll present. The proceedings opened with prayer. The Vicar referred to the death of Mr. Creane, the devoted Secretary of the Lads' Club, who had during the last few years brought at least two bright evenings a week into the lives of hundreds of lads in the Parish. He said that Mr. Creane would be much missed and that he was sure Mrs. Creane had the sympathy of all present. The meeting stood in silence. The Vicar also announced the unavoidable absence of several people owing to indisposi-

tion. After the Minutes of the last Meeting had been read, the Parochial Church Officer read a Report of the doings of the Parochial Church Council for the Year 1933. Five Meetings had been held and amongst the activities undertaken by the Council were a Whist Drive and the Summer Fête.

Mr. Evans presented the Statement of Accounts for 1933. He pointed out with regard to collections that they were between thirty and forty pounds more than in 1932. The Christmas collections were nearly as much as the record year of 1926. Once more the Church had paid its Quota of Obligation to the London Diocesan Fund, viz., £72 10s. od.

With regard to the Parochial Church Council Account Mr. Evans drew the attention of the gathering to a drop of about thirty pounds in the Assessments and said he hoped this would be more than made up this year by new subscribers. He pointed out savings in many items of expenditure and mentioned that the small deficit would have been a slightly increased balance if the whole of the money which it was hoped the Talent Fund would bring in had been collected before the end of December.

In the unavoidable absence, through illness, of Mr. Jakeman, Mr. Evans presented the Parish Hall Account which was in a very satisfactory condition. During the year from the Fête and from the letting of the Hall a sum of two hundred pounds had been paid off the debt leaving only a balance of £150 due to the private loan. The Committee hoped to be able to pay £50 more of this off at their next meeting.

The Magazine Account and the Charities Accounts were also presented and all showed very satisfactory balances. Miss Jakeman and Mr. Girling were heartily thanked for their work in

connection with the Parish Magazine. To Mr. Evans, Mr. Jakeman and the kind Auditors of the various Accounts hearty votes of thanks were also accorded.

A report on the fabric, goods etc., of the Church was given by Mr. Evans. He pointed out that some work would have to be done on the Church Tower in the near future, as well as repairs to the Church wall and a certain amount of painting.

After the reports the meeting proceeded to the Election of lay representatives to the Ruri-decanal Conference and the Parochial Church Council. The following Lady and Gentlemen were elected to the R.D. Conference:—Miss Jakeman and Messrs. Ardley, Cox, Girling and Lovell. The Ladies and Gentlemen on the Parochial Church Council for 1934 are as follows:—Mrs. Carpenter, Mrs. Cox, Mrs. Creasy, Mrs. Evans, Mrs. Franks, Mrs. Grange, Mrs. Harvey, Miss M. Harvey, Miss Hews, Miss Jakeman, Mrs. Spears and Mrs. Wheatley and Messrs. Alford, Ardley, Child, Cox, Creasy, Garrett, Girling, Jakeman, Lovell, Sargeant, L. Singleton, Tandy. The appointment of twelve men to serve as Sidesmen for the year concluded the Elections.

The Vicar in his remarks said that he thought the Church affairs were in a satisfactory condition. He thanked all who had in any way worked for the Parish, the Church and its Services during the past twelve months.

At the end of the business the Vicar closed the meeting with the Benediction.
