# Vicar's Letter.

My DEAR PEOPLE.

This month is going to be a very busy one, particularly with regard to special calls to intercessory prayer. To begin with there is the annual Diocesan Week of Prayer from Sunday, November 18th, to Sunday, November 25th, when the faithful throughout the Diocese meet in their respective parish Churches to commend to God the work of the Church in all other parishes together with their own, to think over and pray for the problems peculiar to the Church's work as a whole and to create a wider prayer-practising interest in the larger family. It is a wonderful opportunity for us all to get together and pray together on other days than Sundays and will I am sure bring much spiritual benefit to us all individually. I want you all to make up your mind that on two or three days of the week every other engagement shall be scrapped because you have an engagement with God.

Having met together and faced the difficulties and needs of the Church in all parts of the Diocese and prayed to God to help us to remove those

difficulties and to supply those needs, the question will naturally follow: -What can I personally do in the matter? The answer is that you are called by God through His servant the Bishop to make definite acts of self-denial throughout the week. Just stop smoking for a week, give up your golf or any other game for the week, withdraw your presence from that football match, do not go to the pictures, walk, instead of indulging in short bus rides. In fact do something to show that you are really sincere in your prayers. Then put the sums that result from those various acts of selfdenial into the envelopes which will be provided for the purpose and bring them to Church on the Saturday at the times appointed (see elsewhere). Try if you possibly can to be present on Sunday evening when they will be offered in thanksgiving These offerings will form part of our Quota to the London Diocesan Fund which is the medium through which those needs about which we have been praying are supplied. Please make it clear in your mind that these offerings are the result of special acts of self-denial, because we must not let our collections on Sunday, November 25th suffer since they will be given to the S.P.G. Quota this year is £83 of which only about £6 is in hand at present.

And here I would draw your attention to the S.P.G. Sunday, November 25th. From those who come to speak to us we shall hear the needs of the Church overseas. They are as great as our own needs at home, if not greater. If the Church of Christ is to extend and not retrench her work then all members must give their financial help as well as their prayers. In these days of so-called financial strain we often think it hard to be asked to give more from what we consider to be our restricted resources, but, my friends, the majority of us are spending far more on pleasure than our forefathers did and to do this we are with-holding our due share of support to that Society of which by Baptism we are all members. We can all give much more proportionately towards the work of our Church than we do give. Let us pray God to stir up within us the will to give.

Following closely upon our Missionary Sunday comes the day of Intercession for Mission work overseas. If, as in our Missionary Notes it is suggested, there is to be a "stream of prayer" all day some twenty four members of the congregation must take one half hour each. Double this number should easily be forthcoming and I hope there may be more. There will be two celebrations of the Holy Communion at 7.30 a.m. and 11 a.m. and Intercession Services at 10.15 a.m., 3.30 p.m. and 6 p.m.

In about a month's time it will be our duty to revise our Electoral Roll. What is the Electoral Roll? It is a list of men and women resident in the parish or if not residents, regular worshippers at the Church of eighteen years of age and upwards who are baptized and declare that they are members of the Church of England and do not belong to any religious body not in communion with that

Church. The duty of such qualified electors is to meet together at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting to elect the Parochial Church Council for the ensuing year, to elect representatives to the Ruri-decanal Conference, to elect the Sidesmen and to hear reports on the proceedings of the late Parochial Church Council, on financial matters and on the fabric, goods and ornaments of the Church. Besides this the meeting gives an opportunity to all electors to bring forward any matter which may help the well-being of the Parochial life of the Parish. There are many people attending the Church who are not on the Roll. I should be glad if they will ask for a form of application to have their names added to the Electoral Roll so that we may have a complete list before our next Annual Meeting in January, 1935

Armistice Day falls on a Sunday this year. It is fitting that now and again this does so happen lest we should forget more and more that the foundation upon which we are trying to reconstruct national and international life is that of the sacrifice of the lives of millions of the flower of the manhood of the Countries directly concerned in the Great War. One of the surest ways of preventing war is to be reminded from time to time of what it costs in human life. When we hear the names of those who died during 1914-1918 read out each Armistice Sunday we realise the price of peace sixteen to twenty years ago and what it may be now with an increase of more deadly weapons for warfare to-day. We have been praying and working for lasting peace ever since those terrible days. but all the disarmament conferences will be of no avail until the lives of all individuals in all nations are rooted and grounded in mutual love. Shall we make the key note of our prayers on November 11th, "Brotherly Love."
