Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

This month we are somewhat taxed for news because so many interesting gatherings took place in January after we had gone to print.

I am sure you will all like to know that the debt on the Parish Hall Building Fund has at last been cleared off. It is something to have accomplished, and I am most grateful to all who have by donations, proceeds of entertainment and other ways helped to raise the necessary money. The clearance of this debt will leave a certain amount of money free for other purposes, it will also enable us to concentrate our efforts on other necessary and pressing things. Nothing is so urgent at the moment as an addition to the Staff. Large houses are being displaced by numbers of smaller ones and month by month the population of the parish is steadily increasing. What troubles me is that I am unable to get round and greet all the new-comers until they have resided for a considerable time in the village and have begun to think that the Church does not care about them. My appeal for 19 subscribers of five pounds is meeting with some success. There are some who think that the amount could be raised more easily if it were spread over a larger number of people.

I shall of course be pleased to receive promises of smaller annual sums and should like such promises to be sent to me at once. Assured of the Stipend of an Assistant Priest or Deacon by the end of March we could look forward to being adequately staffed after the Trinity Ordination.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was held too late to include any notice of it in this month's issue. I should however like to thank the members of the 1934 Parochial Church Council for their work during the year. Probably most of them will be serving again for this year and I am sure they will all work hard to accomplish any matters that require particular attention.

There appears to be a steady improvement in the life of the parish as a whole. The congregations at times show an increase though numbers fluctuate. The girls and infants departments of the Sunday School are increasing, we should like to see a proportionate growth in the boys department. There is still the need of a Bible Class for lads to be materialised. I should gladly welcome the offer to undertake this very necessary work.

I cannot think that Hampton Hill is such an unmusical place that it contains no tenors or basses. The wireless has made many who have the gift of a moderate voice shy in exercising it. But

Death has robbed us of two old members of the congregation during the last month. Miss Chamberlain and Mr. Tozer have passed on to their rest. They both took great interest in parochial matters. We extend to their sorrowing relatives our sincere sympathy.
