## Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

The congregations on Good Friday and Easter Day were distinctly good. The Rev. H. Schofield's addresses at the Three Hours Devotions were much appreciated and I have sent our thanks to him for his help.

The Easter Communion were up to the average, although many of the regular members of the congregation had taken advantage of the few days holiday to have a change from home. The choir sang their parts of the services exceedingly well. Many have spoken with great appreciation of their singing. The Church was tastefully decorated, thanks to those who sent an abundance of beautiful flowers and to the decorators. I am very grateful to you all for your kindness to me on Easter Day.

It is sometimes thought that once Lent and Easter are over the parson's heaviest work of the year is over. Of course these seasons do tax one's physical and mental powers, but they are by no means the beginning and end of the ordinary parish priest. One thing is hardly over before the next important event has to be thought of and organised,

besides the usual routine of parochial life which in these days is always strenuous. Just now the clergy are snowed-up with notices of the Annual Meetings in London of various Societies, all of which are worthy of support but no one parish can help them all. You will see notices of two such meetings in another part of this magazine. The Church Army appeals to me as much as any because its work is very extensive. It is the one Church Society to take an active part in the Housing problem and it is always caring for the down and outs. The Church Army deserves all the help Church people can give. The Industrial Christian Fellowship is also doing a good work dealing with religion in its bearing upon the social and economic questions of the day. Later on we are to have a preacher who will explain the work of the Fellowship to us.

We have to look forward this month to two more great Festivals of the Church. First of all there is Ascension Day on Thursday, May 21st. So many Church people have got into the habit of keeping this Festival of the Ascension of our Lord on the Sunday after. I have put down three celebrations of the Holy Communion and an

Evensong for the Festival at times which should be convenient to all, even those who catch an early train to town. It is the Empire Day of the Church. Jesus is the Ascended Lord; and His Ascension is the symbol of His finality. He is on the throne of the Universe. All faithful citizens of Christ's Kingdom should keep this day. I do hope for greater numbers at the various services.

This Festival is preceded by the three Rogation Days. Days of intercession for a fruitful harvest. They remind us of how much we have to depend upon God for the necessities of life. Not that He does all and we need do nothing. But He co-operates with us. We dig and plant and at times water, but it is God who gives the increase. While however we think of the material harvest on those days we do not forget the spiritual harvest; the ingathering of souls, and therefore the missionary work of the Church looms largely in our thoughts and prayers at this time. And here I would ask you all to pray that God will raise up someone in this parish to carry on the good work in the cause of foreign missions which Miss Jakeman has done for many years.

Finally this month we shall be keeping the birthday of the Church. Whit-Sunday falls on the last day of May. On that day we commemorate the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on that little band of Apostles and Disciples of the Ascended Lord who were to be the foundation of the Church of Christ and through whom the ingathering of the first-fruits of the Church of Christ was to be affected. May we all fittingly keep this Festival in Communion and Fellowship, in worship of praise and thanksgiving.

As far as more mundane events are concerned we look forward to a dance in the Parish Hall organised by the Social Committee of the Parochial Church Council. It is the last of this seasons

events and I hope a large gathering of dancers will be present.

Having missed a year we are having a Jumble Sale again. I note that one or two more are being organised in the district but I hope there will still be plenty left for us. The object to which a greater part of the proceeds are to be devoted viz. the Nurse Fund, should make a strong appeal to all to save their jumble for our collector's van.

An effort is being made to raise money for purchasing the remainder of the furniture for the Children's Corner. Please back up this effort, so that we may be able to dedicate this Corner during Whitsun Festival.

Not before it is absolutely necessary we are having the Church thoroughly cleaned. The Globe Company of cleaners are to undertake this work during the week commencing May 4th. There will therefore be no week-day services while the work is being done.

Please make a note of the Annual Fête. Many of you who read this letter may be fond of fancy needlework. Will you begin to do some work for the Vicarage Stall?
