Vicar's Letter.

MY DEAR PEOPLE,

It is many years since Easter fell as late as it will this year and over twenty-five since we had the full six Sundays after Epiphany. We shall have had six weeks to learn the many lessons of the Epiphany Season by studying the different aspects of the manifestation of God's only begotten Son to the world. From the time when Jesus, God manifest in the flesh, received the adoration of the Gentiles in the persons of the Magi from the East, until the end of the Epiphany Season we have looked back upon God Incarnate in the Man Christ Jesus exhibiting His Power and Glory, gathering a small band of faithful followers and as He went in and out amongst the people preparing for the Establishing of His Kingdom upon Earth in the form of the Church in which are to be gathered those who should become citizens of the Heavenly Kingdom. Nor must we forget that the Epiphany of Jesus was the revelation of the Divine Fatherhood to the world. As far as we are concerned this season which is just ending reminds us of the twofold purpose of Christ's manifestations. Jesus was manifested to destroy the works of the devil and to make us the Sons of God. So we turn our thoughts to Jesus as Saviour and prepare to follow Him as He takes

up the challenge of evil in His temptations in the wilderness and pursues that challenge through His life on earth as the man of sorrows and acquainted with death, until He defeats it upon the cross of calvary and wins for mankind the freedom of the children of God. We must make ready to follow Jesus along the way of Sorrows not forgetting that the grave and gate of death opened upon the Glorious Resurrection for Him and was for us the gate of everlasting life. Our calling is to follow Him along the way of holiness and so in our keeping of Lent while beholding Him bruised, smitten and afflicted for our transgressions we must search our inmost hearts for those transgressions in our own lives which made Him suffer and by a strict period of penitence obtain forgiveness of our sins through His precious Blood and power to help us to progress in the amendment of our lives. This Lenten Fast which we anticipate has a very apt message for the world today. Through this season the nations allied to freedom's cause will be passing through the severest portion of the struggle. We look out upon the successes of our allies in Russia, in the far east and of our own forces in Libya and we thank God for all that has been done to conquer the common foe, the evil in the world. But complete victory may be some distance off

and even when the Axis forces are vanquished the real struggle for the real victory will have only just begun. The cessation of the clash of arms in the battle-fields will but open the gate to that victory which we have visualised for so long, the victory of freedom. And looked at from any angle you like the Charter of Freedom as enunciated in what has become familiar to us as the Atlantic Charter will be possible of accomplishment only if it is based on Christian verity, which is upon Christ Himself. As we follow Him through His victorious conflict for Freedom, let us remember that that Freedom which He won for us on Calvary is the very Freedom we are hoping for after the war because it is the Liberty of the Sons of God and we are all Sons of God. It is for us to take this Freedom which He offers us and we can do this only by becoming His true and loyal soldiers and servants, by returning to Him and giving ourselves up entirely to His guidance through the Holy Spirit which He has given us. May our Lent be of such a kind this year that with hearts changed and purified we may gather at the Altar on Easter Day to receive the Power of His Resurrection Life and in that Power go forth with Him as our Captain to win the real victory of Freedom for a world now making a desperate effort to destroy the forces of thralldom.

The Clergy of all Denominations in the Borough of Twickenham have decided to hold an Evangelistic effort in all places of Worship in the area from May 23rd to 30th. Each Church is to make its own arrangements for what will virtually be a seven days Mission. I am making some plans and am arranging with a Missioner to come and lead us during those seven days. Certain leaflets will be distributed shortly and further information will be given in next month's issue

of the Magazine. The Mission is to be known by the title of "The Battle for Britain" and its object is to use the Church as Christ's means of drawing men and women unto Him. Directly I receive the preliminary leaflets I shall call a meeting to consider how best to carry out the purpose of the Mission in this Parish.

Appointment of Almspersons.

The Trustees of these Charities give notice that they will on **Tuesday, the 16th day of February, 1943,** meet at the West Porch of St. Mary the Virgin Church, Hampton, at 8 p.m. to appoint **two** Almspersons of the Charities. Poor persons of either sex and of good character, married or single who have been resident in the Parish of Hampton for not less than five years at the time of appointment, who are not at the time in receipt of Poor Law relief other than medical relief, and who from age, ill-health, accident or infirmity are unable to maintain themselves by their own exertions are eligible for the appointment. Preference will be given to those who have shown reasonable providence and where claims are other-

wise equal, to those who have been longest resident in the said Parish. **Applications** must be made in writing to the Trustees or their Clerk, at 51, High Street, Hampton, **on or before the 13th February, 1943.** Every applicant must state his or her name, address, age and occupation and must produce sufficient testimonials and other evidence of his or her qualification for appointment and attend in person if required to do so.

The Church Army.

The Church Army's War Work is the Church's own endeavour to meet the tremendously important need for providing adequate facilities for the men and women of the Services. Within the limits of its financial resources the Society is meeting increasing demands for Recreation Huts and Centres, Men's and Women's Clubs and Hostels and Mobile and Station Canteens. The Mobile Canteens meet the needs of many isolated units and serve 300,000 men per week. The various Static units serve another half-million weekly. On the Civilian Front, Mobile Canteens have been of the greatest comfort to thousands in the blitzed cities and towns. Abroad, the Church Army has centres in Eritrea, Libyan Desert, Egypt, Palestine, Cyprus, Damascus and India. The Society also has Canteens, Clubs and Hostels all over Great Britain. In order to help keep this great work going and to meet the increasing calls upon it the Church Army is having a Flag Day on **Saturday, 17th April,** and it is hoped that this effort will be liberally supported in all the Parishes. Hampton Hill Parish has been asked to organise a Depot and the Vicar will be glad to have names of those willing to sell flags as soon as possible.
