A NOTE ABOUT USING LENT.

By the time this magazine appears, Lent will be almost upon us. It is easy for us to be caught unprepared, and so perhaps to drift right through Lent in an indecisive kind of way and with an uneasy conscience that we really ought to be doing something about it and yet we aren't. Then at the end we are left with a feeling of frustration and opportunity wasted. Another Lent has gone by without our having used it. It has been unfruitful and unproductive of good.

I am no expert in keeping Lent, and it is with diffidence that I make any suggestions. But I would say that a rule and an aim are necessary: and usually these need comprise no more than three definite points. It is so easy to lose ourselves in a multiplicity of resolutions

and renunciations.

We might include in our rule such points as these:-CONCENTRATION: For example, in church, so that my worship is more real, and plays its part in making the whole service less unworthy of God. I should be very practical about this, and say: During Lent, at every service I attend, I will concentrate with all my power on one or two particular parts, especially those that usually slip by me without any conscious thought on my part. Those may be the Collects, or the responses, or the Magnificat. Very well: I will try my utmost to understand what I say and to mean what I say. Or it may be the action of the Offertory at the Communion: an action intended to be so meaningful, but allowed by us to pass almost unnoticed: Well, this Lent, as the bread and the wine mixed with water are placed on the altar, I will concentrate on the inner meaning of that action, so that it does become in fact a real offering of my whole life -work and recreation, joys and sorrows, home and friends—to God, that He may sanctify and bless it all.

This concentration on particular aspects of the service will of course extend naturally to other parts too, and my "church-going" will become much more full of significance — and interest — than it used to be.

Then concentrate too in other ways—perhaps in reading right through a good book that really requires
