Vicar's Dotes.

CONFIRMATION: - I should be glad if all interested in this subject would come to the evening service on Sunday, June 24th. I intend to preach on some aspects of Confirmation, and its meaning, After the service there will be a short meeting to arrange details about classes for those who wish to go more fully into this important matter. If you wish to be confirmed towards the end of the year, it is important to come in now at the start, and not to wait until classes have already been fermed, as some people always seem inclined to do so please make this known as widely as possible to any intending candidates.

At 8 o'clock the same evening, the Youth Club intend to hold the second in a series of experimental Sunday evening meetings. On this occasion I have been asked to open a discussion, and there will also be community singing and light refreshments. In many places, meetings of young people such as this after the evening service have become well established and a real success, and there seems no reason why they may not be equally successful here (though I confess that I myself on Sunday evenings now usually relax and listen to 'Barchester Towers'—Perhaps this is a sure sign of middle-age!).

A MEN'S SOCIETY:— In some parishes there is a tendency to split up the congregation into a number of separate groups, the members of which hardly ever meet all together. We do not wish this to happen here, and so at the last Church Council meeting we discussed whether the next step might not be to form a comprehensive society - Fellowship or Parish Meeting - for all who belong to our church. In the end, we decided not to do this straight away, because it was felt that a Men's Society might fill a more urgent need, and that its formation would not weaken, but should strengthen, the whole family life of the parish. So we hope to have a prelimmeeting about this on June 20th, at 8.0 p.m. in the Parish Hall, and are inviting two well-known members of the Church of England Men's Society to come to to us on this occasion. We hope that all our men turn up in force, and that we may be able to estabhere a good branch of this Society.

Reports

CHURCH ACCOUNTS, 1950:— In last month's issue a report was given of the Annual Church Meeting, which took place on April 4th.

At this Meeting the Audited Accounts were presented and for the information of those who were not present brief remarks about them are found below. The detailed Accounts are posted in the South Porch of the Church for those who desire to peruse same.

PROPERTY ACCOUNT:— The adverse balance of £121 1s. 1d. with which the year opened was reduced to £52 0st 10d. by the 31st December. This improvement was due to lower maintenance expenditure, the income being almost the same as that for 1949.

MAGAZINE ACCOUNT: - In spite of rising costs of production there was a small balance in hand similar to that at the end of 1949.

COLLECTION ACCOUNT: - The Receipts and Payments differed little from the previous year, the balance carried forward to the P.C.C. Account being £151 13s, 0d. against £160 3s. 1d.

P.C.C. ACCOUNT: This reflects that Income was insufficient to meet Expenses by £26 0s. 8d., but in view of the difficulties of the year, the position must not be considered unsatisfactory. The Fete produced £29 less than in 1949, Freewill Offerings were £15 higher.

The Churchyard is a big strain on our Income, the annual cost being about £110 which does not cover all that should be done, but contributions for this specific purpose were cnly £16 7s. 3d. P.O.S.B, FUND: The Special Monies deposited were as follows:-
