Vicar's Notes

Owing to lack of space, there is no room for the last half of my 'Report' to the Annual Meeting, but some of the matters mentioned there will no doubt come up from time to time in monthly notes. One encouraging feature of 1952 to which I referred was the way in which our domes-tic finances recovered after the decline of 1952. The Treasurer's figures, given on another page, make welcome reading. But they also show that a great deal depends on our Summer Fête. This may be a good thing, or bad; but is something we have at the moment to accept, and once again the time is upon us to do all we can to make it a great success. By the kindness of Matron and the Middlesex County Council, the lovely grounds of Laurel Dene are again at our disposal on Saturday, July 2nd, and here is an occasion ready to hand when people can enjoy themselves and also much to free the Church from financial difficulties during the expensive months of winter. those who would also like to help in a regular and systematic way, the Free-Will Offering Scheme is available, and Mr. Wigginton will be glad to supply information to anyone who asks for it.

But as well as our immediate day-to-day needs, there are the liabilities from the past, and the long-term needs for the future. It is now clear, for instance, that the renovation of the church-building is going to be a much longer and far more costly job than was first anticipated. Essential work, without which the church would soon have become a decayed ruin, has cost us over £1600 in the past 24 years, and when outstanding accounts have been paid there will be a deficit on the Renovation Fund of £150. This has caused us to defer work which was shortly to have been put in hand on the inside of the tower and the clock (estimated cost £270) for at least another year. The Mothers' Union have recently given £20 to the the proceeds of their Jumble Sale, and their choir is giving an 'At Home' on June 8th at 3.0 p.m., which will help still further. Many of you are planning Coffee Parties and similar efforts; visits to the Tower are possible on most Saturday afternoons, and at other times; and we hope for a big increase in funds from the Box-Opening on June 14th. We are undoubtedly faced with a great task, but if people go on helping in their present spirit, there is no doubt about the outcome.

We also, of course, need to raise a capital sum for the Parish Hall and for Wayside: buildings cannot be maintained without big repairs and extensive decorations from time to time. We have already received one gift of £25 for Wayside, and hope others—or interestfree loans—will follow. The plans for the alterations to the house (ably prepared by our own Mr. Coxon, at no expense to us, but at the cost of much time and trouble to him, for which, and for all his skill and care, we are very grateful) are still passing through the various stages of approval different authorities necessary before any work can be put in hand, but we hope to open the groundfloor for parish use on the occasion of the breakfast after the Confirmation and Parish Communion on July 10th, when we hope that the Bishop of Kensington will be able to bless the house.

It is a matter of great concern to many of us that our own financial needs should loom so large that we are not able to give the support and help to other people and causes that we should like to We shall, however, in September, have an opportunity to do something we have often talked about but not put into effect—and that is, to give help to some of the millions of refugees who are in such desperate plight. There is be a concentrated Boroughwide effort, and our Church Council has pledged its full support.

We welcome as our new People's Warden Mr. Melville. He had the joy of being Churchwarden for many years at Abadan in Persia, where the Church had no financial worries of its own, everything being provided by the Oil Company, and so was able to give all its collections to good causes throughout the world. But he has

already shown that he is very well able to adapt himself to our very different circumstances here in Hampton Hill, and we hope that he will also have much joy as well as hard work and difficult problems as he discharges the duties and responsibilities of his honourable office—and I am sure he will have the loyal backing of us all.
