# THE CHURCH OVERSEAS DEFEATING MAU MAU

Courageous Kikuyu Christians who have suffered at the hands of Mau Mau are continuing boldly to witness to their Lord. A C.M.S. missionary in Kenya writes:

"It is Saturday, and in this great Church are gathered no fewer than 2,000 Kikuyu who have come to hear the Word of God. In the front of the Church are seated eight Kikuyu Christians, all of whom have experienced what it means to face death for their Lord; among them are a builder, housewife, an evangelist, a school-master and one or two ministers. This is no isolated occurrence, but one of the regular Conventions through which Kikuyu Christians are winning their people for Christ. Of the one hundred who stood up at the end of this week-end and professed allegiance to Christ for the first time, the majority had until recently been Mau Mau supporters. Please pray for these Conventions."

## LET'S DO IT NOW

At a school in Uganda three African schoolgirls were helping to prepare the food in the kitchen. "God is very good to give us all these things, isn't He?" said one. "Yes, He is; we really ought to

love Him more, oughtn't we?" said the second. "We have heard often enough that He wants the service of our whole lives; why don't we give our lives to Him? Let's do it now," said the third. Together they knelt among the banana peelings and gave themselves to Christ. They are now witnessing to their friends and others have been converted.

## ENCOURAGING NEWS FROM PAKISTAN

"I was greatly encouraged by the eagerness of the Muslim men and women to listen to the Gospel," writes one who has been engaged in literacy and evangelistic work in Pakistan recently. "In one town we preached in the bazaar and then invited the people to come to the Church compound. Among the crowd who came there were between three and four hundred Muslims who listened attentively to the story of God's provision of salvation through His Son."

"In another district the women climbed on to the roof of a house in order to hear the Gospel. The load was too great, and the roof collapsed! Fortunately no one was hurt. Such eagerness has made me decide to open a small Bible Depot in that area. Please pray for this venture."
