# HAMPTON/HAMPTON HILL OLDER CITIZENS' CENTRE ASSOCIATION

The object of the Association is the provision of a Day Centre which will afford recreation, companionship, comfort and a midday meal at a subsidised price for elderly persons resident in Hampton/

Hampton Hill.

The project is wholeheartedly supported by the London Borough of Richmond-upon-Thames who have placed a site at the disposal of the Association. It therefore falls to the Association to raise the money for the erection of the building by public subscription and to manage the Centre when the project is realised. That cannot be achieved without help from you all.

Local authorities and medical opinion hold the view that deterioration in the condition of elderly people, with the accompanying symptoms of reluctance to care for themselves, is arrested if they are assisted to participate in normal activities. Only too often they are inclined to lead a solitary life and slowly withdraw into a world of

their own.

There wll, of course, always be some elderly people who, by reason of physical incapacity, are literally housebound. The sole solution to their plight is for them to be visited regularly by volunteers and to be served by "Meals on Wheels." It is expected that these services will

operate from the projected Centre.

Ours is an Association which includes representatives of Hampton Old People's Welfare Association, Hampton Hill Old People's Welfare Committee, Hampton Tenants' Association, The British Red Cross Society and the W.R.V.S. The Hampton/Hampton Hill Older Citizens' Centre Association is an independent body and in no sense supplants the work done by any of these organisations.

The keynote of the undertaking is the **participation** of you all in a rewarding cause. You can help in many different ways and the more of you there are, the less there will be for each one of you to do.

Establishment of such a Centre will avert the disruption of elderly people's lives and obviate the need for the provision of residential accommodation by the Corporation.

## EXTRACTS FROM THE SECRETARY'S HALF-YEARLY REPORT, JULY 1969

I am writing to all members and friends to give an up-to-date

report on our progress and activities.

In the first place we are very pleased to say that the tenants of our first property (at 2 Park Avenue, S.W.14) are in occupation and seem most happy with their accommodation in four self-contained bedsitter flatlets, designed by our architect Mr. Paul Gardner. The tenants are four ladies, two of them elderly and two disabled with arthritis.

The search for suitable properties has continued apace and we are now in contract for three more properties and expect to sign a contract for a fourth very soon. We are aiming, with some success, to spread our activities throughout the borough; our new properties are in Teddington, Richmond, Mortlake and East Sheen. In addition offers have been accepted for two further houses in Hampton and Teddington. All these are older properties, suitable for conversion into flats for elderly couples or single people. Where possible we intend to include some provision for young couples or families, whose need in this area is acute. If all these schemes proceed they will provide over 30 flats, for which we have a long waiting list of local applicants in serious housing need.

A bigger scheme is for the purchase of the Wigan Hall site in Mortlake, and here we propose to build a block of 18 flats of varving size. Our offer for the site has been accepted and it seems probable that the necessary finance will be forthcoming. This scheme will take much longer to complete but we hope that by the end of the year we

shall have something definite to report.

So far we have been able to finance our purchases, but as we expand we shall need increasing cash resources—to pay deposits on properties and interim payments to builders, and to cover the shortfall in cases where we are unable to borrow the full cost. We should also like to set up a discretionary fund to draw on for furnishing necessities in some cases, and for garden improvement.

In view of all these needs we are most grateful to those Churches and individuals who have already helped us financially. We are hoping, however, that now our dreams are becoming reality—of doing something locally to meet housing problems—there will be many more members of our Churches who will wish to become associated with

the Trust.

### TWICKENHAM AND DISTRICT ASSOCIATION FOR MENTAL HEALTH: TWO APPEALS

(1) This Association is proposing to run a coach from Hounslow and Twickenham to Springfield Hospital for relatives and friends to visit patients there on Wednesday afternoons.

When the coach arrives at the hospital we will take some of the patients, who have no visitors, shopping or for a drive in Richmond

Park, depending on the number of volunteer helpers.

This scheme has been run very successfully by the Ealing Mental Health Association, but this has only been achieved with the help of other organisations in their district.

We are asking whether any of your organisations would be able

to take over one Wednesday afternoon approximately every six weeks. This would require 6 voluntary helpers to go with the bus and then to help with the shopping or drive in the Park.

This is a very worth while service and we do hope you will be

able to assist us.

(2) The Association is holding its Autumn Fair at St. John's Ambulance Hall, Park Road, Teddington, on Saturday, October 4, starting at 11.30 a.m. Mrs. Orton, 30, St. James's Road, is running the Jewellery Stall and would be very grateful for gifts of unwanted costume jewellery. Most people have at least one article they do not want and if everyone who reads this gave just that one little item the stall would be furnished. There will be a cup of tea, a biscuit, a sit-down and a chat at No. 30 on the afternoon of Tuesday, September 30, to spur you on to looking out your bits and pieces!
