ARRANGEMENTS FOR LENT

A request was made over 18 months ago that we should in Lent make a change from our practice of recent years of giving extensive consideration to the wider work and mission of the Church, with perhaps overmuch discussion and too little quiet — such enterprises as No Small Change, People Next Door, etc. — but instead turn our attention towards its inner life — and our own inner life — and see how this might be deepened despite all the pressures and stresses of modern life. To redress the balance, we should now think of being rather than doing, contemplation rather than action, and realise the importance of these former and how they undergird the latter.

The Liturgical Committee agreed that this was an excellent idea, but the difficultp came in trying to find the right person to help and guide us. After much correspondence, the plan had to be put aside for Lent last year, and a scheme of our own devised, in which our friends from the Congregational Church joined us. But for this Lent Sister Audrey, of the Community of the Sisters of the Church, from St. Michael's Convent at Ham, and also a teacher on the staff of The Old Palace School in Croydon, has kindly consented to come to our aid. She will be with us on Tuesdays March 2, 16 and 30, at 8.0 p.m. in Wayside. In between we will be free to make our own plans for meeting in a body at Wayside, or in smaller groups in different houses, to follow up the ideas which she has put before us and to express and practise them in prayer. Many people are restless and unhappy today because of the lack of an adequate spiritual life, or because this life is not growing and developing as it should, and here is an opportunity to begin to put things right of which I hope that many of us will take advantage.

After we had made our own arrangements — apparently well ahead this time, for the Hampton Council of Churches found that we were the only church with our plans settled last October — the Council decided that as we could not agree on the holding of a united mission in the area, we should join together in an ecumenical enterprise as much like this as possible, and hold it in Lent. This would be an alternative kind of attempt to strengthen beelievers in their faith and to interest enquirers and help them to resolve their doubts and uncertainties. It would consist of a series of open meetings dealing with questions much in people's minds, with distinguished speakers to answer them, and plenty of time for members of the audience to ask for light on any problems worrying them. The list of questions was duly drawn up, but as we had left it rather late, the difficulty came when we tried to match these with the eminent speakers whom we had in mind. But in the end, again after much correspondence and many telephone calls, a very good and able panel of speakers was secured. These meetings will be held in the attractive new hall of St. Mary's, Hampton very accessible, right on the main road, a few vards from a

bus stop and with good parking facilities - on every Thursday in Lent from February 25 to April 1, beginning at 8.00 p.m. and lasting an hour. It is hoped in the next few weeks to deliver handbills to every home in Hampton and Hampton Hill; these will give full details of subjects and speakers under the general title 'Forum on Faith'. All the churches in the area are supporting this venture, and I hope that, without weakening our own previously-arranged course, people will go down to Hampton on Thursdays taking with them their friends and neighbours, particularly those who have doubts and uncertainties about the whole Christian scheme of things.

The Women's World Day of Prayer is now no longer on the first Friday in Lent but on the first Friday in March. The theme this year is 'A New People for a New Age', and the special form of service which will be used in nearly every country in the world has been drawn up by an interdenominationali group of women from the Caribbean. To study the special Biblical passages as suggested, a group will meet at the Vicarage on February 10 and 17, and the Vicar will also speak about these at the afternoon service at Wayside on Ash Wednesday. At the Mothers' Union meeting on March 3 the findings of the study group will be reported. The services on the day itself — March 5 — will be held at 2.30 and 8.00 p.m. in the Congregational Church, and the special speakers will be Mrs. Eustace and Mrs. Lodder, both of whom left Hampton recently after years of outstanding service. Instead of one of them speaking in the afternoon and the other in the evening, they will set a new pattern, and both speak at each service.

On Mothering Sunday (March 21), members of the Mothers' Union will lead a special Family Service instead of Evensong at 6.30 p.m., and present a small-scale but most impressive Pageant. They will also be arranging the usual Austerity Lunch for the Wednesday in Holy Week (April 7), and at the end of it slides of the Oberammergau Passion Play will be shown.

One question still to be decided is the form our Good Friday observance should take this year. Our main service has always been the Three Hours' Devotion, observed in traditional and many other ways as well, but in recent years more and more churches have been abandoning it, some for a single hour from 2.00 to 3.00 p.m., and this year we hear that St. Mary's is intending to follow suit. The Liturgical Committee and the Church Council will have discussed the matter before this appears in print, and I hope that a wise decision will have been reached. The United Open-Air Service - again the subject of some fierce questioning - will be held as usual at 3.30 p.m., but those who think that it has outlived any usefulness it may have had may come up with suggestions for something different for next year, so this year's may well be the last of a long series.
