Dear Friends,

Easter will be upon us in a few weeks, and so I thought it would be a good thing to start thinking about it now.

Although the person in the street makes such a big thing about Christmas, Easter is, without doubt, the most important Festival of the Church's year. Without Good Friday and Easter Day there would be no Christianity as we know it.

How fortunate are the countries in the Northern Hemisphere, where Easter falls in the Spring. Spring is the right season for Easter, because of the Easter lessons which the Spring-time teaches us, and two words often associated with the Spring, light and life, are good words to think over at Easter time.

Spring is the season of light. The dark days of Winter are over, the sun is shining more often and more strongly, and is rising sooner and setting later to lengthen the hours of daylight. Every Spring dawn reminds us of the women who went to the tomb when the sun was rising and the first light of day was breaking. It is not surprising that many old Easter customs are connected with the dawn, and are observed at daybreak.

Spring is the season of life. The gardens, the fields and woods have been dead all the Winter, and the world of birds and animals has been still too, as they sheltered in quiet nooks from the rain and the cold. In Spring they all come to life. Green growth appears, buds peep out, and flowers soon follow; lambs are born, birds build their nests; creatures whose custom is to hibernate all Winter leave their hiding places in search of food, and start to enjoy the sunshine once more.

The word 'light' occurs very often in the Bible, and often in positions of importance. The author of Genesis, when picturing for us God creating the World, describes God beginning with the creation of light (Gen. Ch. 6, v. 3). The Psalmist speaks of God as a light to man (Psalm 27, v.1). Jesus compares Himself to light (John Ch. 8, v.12). Jesus bids us reflect the light of His goodness in our own lives (Matt. Ch. 5, v. 14-16). If Jesus had not risen from the dead on Easter Morning, the light of joy would never have shone again in the hearts of the first disciples, and in our own hearts today, and much of the light spoken of in Scripture would be quenched for ever.

The word 'life' also occurs often in the Bible, where is sometimes simply means animate existence in this world as opposed to being dead and senseless matter, but especially in John's Gospel, and Paul's Epistles, life often has a much deeper meaning, and signifies the life of the soul. The fact that Jesus did not remain in the tomb on the first Easter Day, but rose from the dead, is an assurance to us that we too live on after what is death as far as this world is concerned, it is a message of life. On each Easter morning we rejoice not only at Our Lord's new life, but at the promise of our own.

We have been thinking of two words 'light' and 'life' separately, let us now place them together. We must have light in our life. The light that shines out from the teaching and example of Jesus, was dimmed by His death, but shone out again in splendour

when he rose from the dead, and today continues to shine; it is the light that we must follow in our actions and daily lives. If we do so, it will lead us to the light of everlasting life.

May you all have a Blessed Easter, filled with the joy of the risen Lord.

Spring in the Churchyard

Great progress has been made with clearing the churchyard during the fine winter months. Not only has the Community Service Project made considerable inroads into previously uncharted territory, but we, ourselves, have been working hard to clear the area between the holly hedge in Park Road and the north side of the church. Here we have uncovered some interesting graves and cleared unsightly old tree stumps which will make the area easier to maintain. Elsewhere, in the middle of the churchyard brambles, ivy and holly have been cut back and already bulbs are blooming in the spring sunshine.

Now as spring approaches, we are already considering how maintenance can be carried out. The dates for the monthly Saturday morning working parties for this year are as follows:

We start at 9.30 am and finish about 12.30 pm with a coffee break about 11.00 am, but if you can only spare an hour, this would be helpful and there are plenty of easy jobs.

In addition to our regular working parties we need someone to cut the lawns (a simple job which can be done in your own time with our electric mower). Also, we should like more volunteers to look after specific areas. Ron Metcalfe, Michael Brunson and Walter Blaschke have taken over areas but we should like more volunteers. The advantage of this arrangement is that work can be done in your own time which some may prefer to joining in working parties.

Helping in the churchyard is a very satisfying job so why not undertake to look after a small area yourself? Please phone us on 979 6325 if you could help take over a small area, or would be prepared to cut the lawns.

The Leprosy Mission

Just over a year ago a representative from the Leprosy Mission gave a talk at Prayer 'n' Praise. He explained the working of the Mission and how that, although many people think Leprosy has been eradicated in the world there are still 15 million or so who are affected mainly in third world countries.

For the sum of £15 many can be cured with modern medicines and even for those who have had the disease for some time the treatment is still very effective although taking longer and so costing more.

I offered to be the St. James's representative and during the past twelve months the sum of £135 has been donated by those who took collecting boxes that night.

Additionally many of you have donated your used stamps and four large packets have been sent to the Leprosy Stamp Bureau. Since its inception in 1971 over £76,000 has been raised from stamps and in 1988 a total of £7,702 was realised. All money raised by the Bureau is given to the Leprosy Mission in order that Leprosy sufferers worldwide may receive treatment in whatever form necessary. Thank you all for your help in this most worthy cause and I look forward to your continuing support in 1989.

Palm Sunday

Canon Gordon Wilson will be the Celebrant at a Celebration of the Institution of the Holy Eucharist and an Agape meal, also at 8.00 pm.

Good Friday

There is to be a procession of witness at 11.00 am to Sainsbury's, Hampton where the Hampton Council of Churches are holding a short service. Soon after, at 12 noon, the Three Hours' Meditation and Devotion will start in our church. The theme will be 'At the foot of the Cross' and it will be taken by the Staff of Read-



ers, Mrs. Lesley Mortimer and, to finish, Canon Gordon Wilson.

Easter Eve (Saturday)

At 7.00 pm there will be a service containing the renewal of Baptismal Vows and a joyful Easter Preparation.

Easter Day

The Celebrant at the 9.30 am Easter Sunday Parish Communion will be Canon Gordon Wilson and there will be a little extra music to help us rejoice at the Resurrection. In the evening at 6.30 pm we shall be singing lots of Easter hymns of rejoicing at the Easter 'Songs of Praise' service, with readings between the hymns.

A Meditation

This time of Lent is when we remember Christ in the barren wilderness. The world is often a wilderness of loneliness, temptation, fear and danger. Christ experienced all of these but rose above them through belief in God and the power of His word to show Man the way, the truth and the life to do the same - until even the wilderness is made fruitful.

'What has happened to the world?' men cry, 'What is happening to people that more and more they are behaving like animals, killing, robbing, raping, plundering?'. What has happened is that they have turned their backs on God. 'We know best,' they cry, 'We don't believe in that old rubbish, we don't need spiritual crutches, we can manage on our own,' and what a mess they are making of it.

Many children only know of God and Christ as swear words. Parents no longer tell their children of the Christian faith because they do not believe themselves, or if, in the remoteness of their minds there lurks belief, they are too busy or too occupied to be bothered to share what they believe with their children and so belief dies where it should begin to live - at the beginning. Christ said 'Who is not for me is against me,' but many are for Him secretly in their hearts when they bother to reflect or when a televised service, a snatch of a hymn, a phrase in a book nudges their consciousness; but their fleeting experience does not call them to action. Faith is not faith if nothing comes from it. Who is to know if you are for Christ or against Him?

If you are <u>for</u> Him, and there are many more who <u>are</u> for Him, far more than those who absolutely reject Him, then follow Him; do not be too busy to accord Him a little of your time, in thought, in prayer, in worship - after all He gave all the time He had for you, and His life for you on the cross. He is risen for you, and stands outside the gates of your soul knocking. <u>Listen to that knocking</u>, do not close the ears of your soul but rise up on your feet and let Him in.

Consider the things you are 'for'. If it is money, you have to go out after it and seek diligently ways, good or bad, of acquiring it. If it is gardening you take a spade, you make a start, sow seeds and tend them. If you are determined and diligent you are repaid in love and beauty - if you never start or give up, your plot is throttled by weeds. If you want to be a chess player, a doctor, a swimmer, a member of a band, an anything, you have to make an effort. So with wanting the world to be a better place, with wanting to be a follower of Christ, with wanting God's will to be done on earth as it is in Heaven. Christ would not have told us to pray for this if it were an impossibility. This will be achieved through men and women following the call and learning to act in the Power of the Holy Spirit. Not before.

Give a minute to real consideration. do \underline{I} want to be one of them? Perhaps this is \underline{my} time. Easter is coming, a time for being raised from darkness into light. Maybe my world will not change until something makes a change in \underline{me} . Following Christ lies not in just 'doing things for Him' but in giving Him the chance to do things for us. He will if we give Him the chance. He has promised to.

St. James's Spire Appeal - 'SOS!'

In the days when our spire was newly built, the signal SOS (in Morse code by wireless telegraphy) was internationally recognised as a distress signal.

Improved radio telecommunications have led to its replacement by the phonetically easier 'M'aidez' or Mayday, but the message remains the same - 'Help!!'

We have sub-titled our Spire Appeal SOS as an acronym for Save Our Spire. Not dazzlingly original; trite maybe.

But we do, literally, have to save our spire, and we are in distress. AT LEAST £10,000 is needed to halt the effects of weather and pollution, and to restore the crumbling fabric.

We know that many are fond, proud even, of this familiar and elegant landmark, and we feel that there will be a widespread local concern to preserve it. SQS
