I am in rather reflective mood as I write this, for it is exactly six years since I began my ministry here as Vicar of St. James. In many ways the time has flown past, but in other ways it seems like a very long time since we took up residence. I took to looking again at T.S. Eliot's play "The Rock" which contains the line 'I journeyed to London'. It is spoken by an anonymous individual with an enquiring mind, eyes and ears open, who arrives in London and looks around.

'I journeyed to London' seems very appropriate to me this week, as I am by no means a Londoner, born and bred. I suspect many parishioners at some stage in their lives journeyed to London - for study, for work, for training, for marrying - and have remained. Many, many of our parishioners journey to London every week day for work. All of us for a variety of reasons journey up to London more or less frequently perhaps to a hospital, to go to the theatre or an exhibition, even to shop!

Last week the name of our new Bishop of London was announced. It is to be Richard Chartres, currently Bishop of Stepney, whose short journey will now be from one part of London to another. It will also be a journey of greatly increased responsibility and pressure, in which we assure him of our support.

Last week too, I journeyed across London, from Hampton Hill to Limehouse, in order to attend a Diocesan meeting. It was a wet, miserable day and I thought how highly inappropriate were the 16th Century poet Dunbar's words

"London, thou art the flower of cities all."

nothing could have been further from the truth.

To get to Limehouse I took the train from Fulwell to Waterloo, the drain from Waterloo to Bank, and the Docklands Light Railway to Limehouse. About sixteen miles divides Hampton Hill and Limehouse, but they appear such different worlds that they could be on separate planets. Yet we are connected as members of the diocesan family with our sisters and brothers there; we are connected as residents of London, and with a stake in the life of our city.

But on the train, in the drain, on the Docklands Light Railway nobody spoke; on the streets people passed one another without a smile. There seemed to be no feeling that we are all in it together. We are now even separate local authorities so that even less seems to bind the people of Richmond to the people of Tower Hamlets. But new Bishop, parishioners of Hampton Hill or Limehouse, we do belong together.

"I journeyed to London" needs to be balanced with St. Paul's words "We are members one of another" as we live with enquiring minds, eyes and ears open to each other.

Courses, Courses & Courses

The Autumn brings with it details of several different courses, some of which we have already mentioned in previous magazines. This is a summary of what is on offer, if you would like any more details please speak to me or Brian.

First of all there is a course being run in our own Church Hall by Stuart Ward:-

MEDITATION CLASSES with Crystals, Colour and Sound.

Commencing on Thursday October 5th 8.00 - 9.30pm.

The fees are £45 for ten sessions.

Stuart says true meditation concentrates the mind and helps us to deal with the stresses and strains of everyday living. Speak to Stuart for more information.

Now something for those who would like to know more about the Old Testament.

The Revd. Dr Angus Stuart, Curate of St. Mary's, Twickenham, is giving a course of six lectures on the Old Testament starting on Monday October 9th at St. Mary's Parish Centre. The title of the first talk is - MONOTHEISM - The Lord our God is one. These talks are not just academic, but aim to make the Old Testament relevant to the present day. The course fee is £6.00, it is advisable to book in advance and send the full fee.

The "Listen to Asia" course we have mentioned before. This course of six talks begin on September 26th and is being held at three different venues. Each talk focuses on a different Asian country, the first being The Philippines. Others to be highlighted are India, Burma, Korea, Sri Lanka and Hong Kong and China. A donation of £2.50 is suggested for each evening to cover the cost.

The well-known annual Bible School at St.Giles-in-the-Fields, is also on a Monday evening starting on October 2nd and consists of eight lectures to be given by Canon Ray Adams, Rector of Ipsley in Worcestershire. The overall title of the lectures is "Precepts of God Incarnate - Divine insights for Human Comprehension". Each lecture is based on a well-known parable and the first talk is called "Good News for All - The Lost Son". This course is free.

Now for details of courses that aim to help people in certain situations - bereavement and caring for the sick.

The Chaplain at the Princess Alice Hospice in Esher is running three courses in the new future.

WHAT IS SPIRITUALITY? Three two and a half hour sessions on Wednesday mornings at 10.00 am starting on September 27th - "How am I made?", "What am I worth?" and "How can I find?". The cost of this course is fifty pounds.

SPIRITUAL CARE OF THE DYING. Four two and a half hour sessions on Friday mornings - helpful for people visiting the sick. This course starts on Friday October 13th at 10.00am and the fee is sixty pounds.

INTERPRETING THE STORIES. Two two and a half hour sessions on Wednesday mornings aimed at helping pastoral visitors interpret 'fear', 'anger' and 'denial'. This course doesn't begin until February 7th but people may like to know in advance. The fee for this course is thirty-five pounds.

It was all very friendly - a perfect end to a really memorable day.

Letter from Zimbabwe

Thursday 24th August.

Mary and I had a splendid three week holiday back with you all in the UK. Beating the bounds on a bicycle for starters! Thank you all for your welcome - we'll be back next July again, DV.

We returned two weeks ago; once again, we are enjoying Zimbabwe's almost perfect weather. Golden sun, blue skies and trees that defy the drought with their green leaves. We can eat a leisurely supper in our porch, watching the sun go down, the temperature staying above 20°c until bedtime. Our garden is mostly brown apart from the trees, but Mary has made some plots with little banks of earth round them and grows an assortment of vegetables, beans, lettuce, spinach, tomatoes, onions and marrows.

Nearly all our washing up water is tipped into buckets and goes on to the vegetables. It is surprising how often we trot into the garden with buckets, and surprising also how well the vegetables grow. Today I took lettuces into work to give to my colleagues. Daily we read or hear of the continuing effects of the drought. In some areas the effects are awful. We begin to feel guilty as we splash in a quick morning shower. I have not yet found a way of saving water from the bathroom, though Mary looks at it gurgling down the drain with some frustration. Today our water meter tells me that we have used more than our daily ration of 440 litres, we shall have to be careful this month.

Our teaching semester is now finishing its second week. The usual juddering starts with imperfect initial attempts to get lecturers and students together in the same place at the same time. I am too old to keep getting cross about poor administration, but I feel disappointed that our thin resources are further wasted in this silly way.

However, as yet we have not got the desperate difficulties that our older sister institution, the University of Zimbabwe, or UZ, in Harare seems to be having. Trouble started when the students did not receive their full grants promptly. Demonstrations turned into riots, and then into street battles. Tear gas has been used, and the situation is not improving. Today the paper headlines are "Government annuls UZ Council". President Mugabe personally discharged the Council members, and will appoint a completely new one. This is dramatic stuff.

My university, NUST, has had some student demonstrations recently. I believe that our militant student president would like to be manning the barricades too. I hope our students have the sense to make their protests without damaging their own interests. We shall see - I'll let you know if they do how we weather the storm. STOP PRESS: student grants have just been increased by 25% - that should do the trick.

- Helping to provide clean water for people to drink by building wells and other water supplies.
- Providing seed so that people can plant crops for their own harvest in years to come.

So this month try to pray especially for the work done by all charities to help others and thank God for all that we are lucky enough to have in our lives - food, clothes, our schools and homes and much, much more.
