Archbishop Desmond Tutu, when accused of dabbling in politics instead of shepherding his flock, countered his critics with these words

"I don't know which bible people are reading when they say Christianity and politics don't mix."

And now, I wonder, who remembers the names and faces of the men and women who propped up the apartheid regime in South Africa? Who can forget the name and face, let alone the irrepressible laughter of Desmond Tutu. Tutu was surely right in his claim. The Christian church believes that the world is made by God, for God's glory and for the fullness of life of all God's children - irrespective of race, wealth, position, religion or any other factor. Christianity is firmly rooted in God's world but it is not trapped or circumscribed by it. Our ministry to the world is to be both pastoral, in standing alongside those in need, as well as prophetic, challenging the forces which seem to go against God's purposes.

To that extent Christianity is deeply embedded in politics - in the good of the 'polis', for the well-being of the whole community. That is why internally, in the Church of England, we don't have priestly, or any other, caste which decides policy or practice, but the whole of our church community is represented in synods and councils, male and female, lay and ordained, young and old, rich and poor, black and white. This month we elect our new Churchwardens and Parochial Church Council for 1997-1998. This will take place at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 20th April at 11am, straight after Parish Communion. This itself is an important sign that what we do in worship and our lifes are to have any intergrity. Please come along on that date, that we might hear a review of what has happened in the life of our parish, taking the opportunity to thank those who have borne responsibility on our behalf. We also wish to look forward with plans for the future and a vibrant and lively council to bring these plans to fruition.

And of course, 1st May 1997 is both another opportunity and responsibility for us as members of the Christian community, to express our views in using our votes prayerfully, responsibly and in accordance with the demands of the Gospel. It is not my place as Vicar to try to influence you in the way you vote, either for the Churchwardens and PCC, or at the General Election. However, I do firmly believe that it is part of my role as Vicar to urge you to use your vote in accordance with you conscience and informed by your faith. I very much hope you will wish to participate in the debate in Church on Sunday 27th April at 7.30pm.

General Election 1997

It is in the nature of Christians to wish to avoid conflict, and not to want to parade their difference. Politics and the General Election are therefore regarded by many as "un-Christian", and certainly not suitable subjects for discussion groups, let alone prayer. If you feel like that, you may have been surprised to see the full page notice in last month's issue about the Diocese of London's *What Local Churches Have to Offer - A Guide to Action* for the General Election.

As we finish our service each Sunday by praying "Send us out in the power of your spirit to live and work to your praise and glory", does it occur to us that this includes how we vote? We know it includes helping the blind man across the road, checking on our elderly neighbour and giving a friend a lift to the shops. We, hopefully, also know it includes how we conduct our lives and what we feel strongly about. But how we vote? Is our democratic right to vote a gift from God? Remember the joy on the faces of black South Africans as they queued for hours, and sometimes days, in the heat, to exercise that right for the first time in their history.

When we pray for God's Kingdom to come on earth, aren't we acknowledging that we have to confront the world as Christ did? Politics is simply people going about their public business and if you don't think the Gospels are political, then perhaps you should read them again.

Whatever your political views, and however exasperated you are by all the media hype and back-biting in this extended general election campaign, can I urge you to spend some time over the next few weeks considering carefully how you will vote. Discuss the issues with your family, friends and neighbours and yes, please pray about it too. Encouraging open and honest debate is not necessarily confrontational, and gives us many opportunities to witness to God's love.

Thankfully the Church does not, as it is often urged to, stay out of politics. In 1986 the Church of England published the controversial *Faith in the City*, and 8th April the Christian Churches together are publishing a report *Unemployment and the Future of Work*. Several Christian groups have prepared "briefings" to enable us to focus on the issues, and copies of some of these will be available at the back of the church for you to borrow.

As an afterthought, if anyone would like to join a discussion/prayer group to prepare for the Election, I should be pleased to arrange it.

The Arms Trade

The United Kingdom is a major player in the international arms trade. Government policy is to encourage, with substantial sums of public money, growth in the export of military equipment. Groups such as the Campaign Against the Arms Trade argue that this direction should be reversed.

Christians approach this issue from a variety of standpoints. The Quakers state unequivocally that they believe the arms trade to be morally wrong, and they go on to argue: "It encourages governments to seek military solutions to political problems and adds to suffering in any resulting conflict. Even if the weapons traded are never used the resources spent to manufacture and buy them are diverted forever from essential human needs such as food and health care". These concerns are not without substance. Somalia, for example, spends twice as much on arms as it does on education and health combined. Twothirds of UK arms exports go to third world countries.

Christian pacifism can be traced back to the early Church. Tertullian stated, "Christ, in disarming Peter, ungirt every soldier.". Origen agreed that it was impossible for Christians to follow mosaic law in killing their enemies. However, from the battle of Milvian Bridge and the conversion to Christianity of the Emperor Constantine, new doctrines justifying war under certain circumstances, and when waged in prescribed ways, came to be adumbrated. The concept of a just war implies a right to self-defence, but limits the use of violence to a proportionate response aimed at combatants and not used indiscriminately.

These principles are incorporated in the UN Charter and international agreements such as the Inhumane Weapons Convention, of which the UK is a signatory. The UK has also agreed to abide by criteria governing arms exports proposed by the European Union, the permanent Face of the United Nations and the Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe. The Government is obliged by these bodies to consider the consequences of arms exports on existing armed conflict, the human rights record of the purchasing government, the effect on international tension within the recipient country, and the technical and economic capacity of the recipient.

Regrettably the process by which these criteria are applied is opaque because of official secrecy. The outcomes can be highly questionable, such as the decision to sell Hawk jets to Indonesia. Senior officers are also questioning these decisions on purely prudential grounds. For example General Sir Hugh Beach, Field Marshall Lord Carver and Admiral Sir James Eberle, in a recent letter to the national press, stated: "There are compelling military reasons for tightly regulating arms sales to regions of tension and instability. The 'boomerang effect' has resulted in European troops facing weapons supplied by their own governments. ... By freely exporting the same weapons used by our own forces we are arming potential future opponents and so have to develop more new equipment to retain any technological edge.".

The just war argument is becoming increasingly threadbare. There have been 82 conflicts, as defined by the UN, in the last three years, only three of which were between nation states. The predominance of intra-state violence has been accompanied by a preponderance of casualties amongst civilians. According to UNDP, at the start of this century 90% of war casualties were military; today 90% are civilian.

In 1930 the Lambeth Conference first declared: "War, as a method of settling international disputes, is incompatible with the teaching and example of our Lord Jesus Christ.". In 1978 the following statement was added: "Jesus through His death and resurrection, has already won the victory over all evil. He made evident that self-giving love, obedience to the way of the cross, is the way to reconciliation in all relationships and conflicts. Therefore the use of violence is ultimately contradictory to the Gospel.".

At a recent ecumenical meeting attended by our MP, I argued that Her Majesty's Government should reverse course. That the Defence Export Services Organisation be closed, Export Credit Guarantees withdrawn and the export licensing process be made much more transparent. That support should be given to revamping Protocol II of the Inhumane Weapons Convention covering land mines and to ratification of Protocol IV banning laser weapons designed to blind people, as well as to extending the scope of the UN weapons register. I am not sanguine that any of this was taken on board.

Organ Appeal Update

Our appeal for "Organ Donors" in February's magazine and also mentioned in the local press, has had an excellent initial response. We have received £4,000 since the beginning of February. This included £210 for a retiring collection at the Byrd Mass and about £700 for the G & S evening on February 22nd. The remainder, over £3,000, has been from Pipe sponsors. We already have sponsors for all the 16 ft Pipes, but there are plenty of 8ft, 4ft, 2ft and 1ft pipes left! Why not sponsor 1ft or 2ft pipes for each member of your family?

6 people have given money via Gift Aid from which we will recover income tax that they will have paid. Details were mentioned in February's magazine.
