The article by Alex Highley (aged 8) in last month's 'Children's Corner' of this magazine made me realise once again how true it is that we take so much for granted, simply because it is familiar. When did you last go round Hampton Court Palace or Madame Tussaud's? The answer, if you are anything like me, is probably the last time you had visitors. Familiarity may not necessarily breed contempt, it is much more likely to breed indifference.

I was recently made aware of a visitor to London who had done all the usual tourist trips..... St. Paul's, Buckingham Palace, Big Ben, the theatres, Hyde Park and the rest. On his last day he didn't know quite what to do, so took the Docklands Light Railway down to its terminus at Island Gardens and walked through the Foot Tunnel under the Thames to Greenwich. He visited the Cutty Sark and the Maritime Museum and then went to the Meridian Courtyard. Of all the things he had seen and experienced he said that standing with his feet on the Greenwich Meridian was by far the most amazing and memorable, because he felt that he was somehow at the very centre of things, or rather that he was at the baseline, along which time is measured throughout the entire world.

I was fascinated by this observation as I had recently read a book called Longitude by Dava Sobel (publ. Fourth Estate, available in Public Library) in which the race to develop a sure and steadfast measure of time, and hence location, was carried out over almost two centuries, spurred on by a king's ransom of £20,000 in 1714. The scientific community from Galileo to Sir Isaac Newton had charted the heavens, but it was one man, largely unheard of today, John Harrison, who developed an accurate method of calculating longitude. I had thought that the book would be a rather dry thing, terribly technical and worthy, but it proved to be a fascinating story of the human construct we call time and space.

It did make me wonder just what our baseline is in other areas of human life. Just where is our baseline, against which we can measure, in terms of truth, honesty, compassion, justice and forgiveness?

Remember Jesus left his home town because nobody was prepared to accept the fundamental principle of love which he lived. So, fellow citizens of London, might I suggest a visit to Greenwich this summer, before the millennium glitz begins, put your feet on the meridian and ask where the baseline in life is for you. And don't be too disappointed if you also find that 'a prophet is without honour in his own country'. Jesus didn't let that stop him living out the baseline of love.

LONDON BRIDGES A Diocese of London Mission Project

New People for a New Millennium

What is it?

London Bridges is about building bridges which will last. It is about shaping a missionary church for the next millennium.

New People for a New Millennium

This reflects three emphases or strands of the project:

- + Recruiting new believers
- We need to invite new people into the life of our churches by building bridges into faith through enquirers courses, school links, youth celebrations, parent and toddlers groups, over 60's clubs etc.
- + Renewing the household of faith

Our churches need to be places where members are motivated to live and work for Christ by building bridges to a closer relationship with God through prayer, worship, nurture and education.

Rebuilding a broken world

It is in our community that the love of Christ is expressed by building bridges between Church and community, with community ministry projects, involvement in such campaigns as Jubilee 2000, and sharing in debate as we approach the new millennium.

The heart of the initiative is local planning and action. It is not a pre-packaged project but an invitation to share in mission together, to discover new ways of sharing and support. However, there will be some diocesan led events and an outline programme is evolving. A regular bulletin is being issued on the *London Bridges* project containing suggestions on how churches can be involved in the project. There will be a Week of Prayer in the diocese in the early autumn, and next Lent a course for *London Bridges* is being prepared.

How we can get involved

- + Pray for this initiative that we may experience and embody the love of God for our City, and have a regular place in our church intercessions.
- + We already have a Mission Action Plan this will need to be more open to new possibilities and concentrate on what might be done in January to June 1999.

If you have any suggestions, plans or ideas for this project please let Brian, one of the Church Wardens or a member of PCC know about them.

I can share it with dear friends and with strangers I encounter from time to time. I always have it with me in life and know that I shall not be separated from it in death. I can leave it to my dear ones and no-one will be able to steal it from them.

The TTC's new theatre in the High Street is still not complete. They were one of the first applicants to the Arts Board of the National Lottery in 1995, but the application was rejected. The second application was submitted in January 1996. The club was visited by the Lottery Assessor in June last year, and in August his report was received recommending the submission with a number of preconditions and conditions which would have to be met before any decision was taken.

Since then TTC Management have been engaged in meeting the pre-conditions which mainly centred around the appointment of a professional Theatre consultant to make recommendations regarding the layout and finishing of the interior.

On Easter Tuesday a large envelope containing the Theatre Consultant's recommendations, together with another consultant's examination to give disabled access, plus a complete business plan covering marketing, publicity and administration for the years ahead, was handed personally to the reception at the Arts Council of England.

These are now being examined and the TTC awaits the decision which should be given very shortly.
