It was G. K. Chesterton who was honest enough to say

'I may not practise what I preach, but for heaven's sake don't preach what I practise.'

It is of course **both** that we are required to do. Each supports and encourages the other, each completes and complements the other. This month we certainly have plenty of opportunity to do both. The Sundays of Easter remind us, through the readings from the Bible, of what it was like for the first friends of Jesus of Nazareth. Slowly, falteringly they came to move from the terror and despondency of the resurrection morning to a deeper understanding that this resurrection means even death could not destroy the love, God's love, which they saw their friend Jesus not only preaching but also practising.

So this month too there is ample chance for us to live out the Easter faith in some very down to earth ways. First we have a responsibility and a duty to cast our vote in the local elections on May 7th. I am delighted that the church hall is again being used as a polling station, because the church is deeply committed to enabling our common life to be rooted in truth, honesty and justice. Second, Christian Aid Week requires collectors and contributors, 'Walk the City' for Christian Aid on Sunday afternoon May 17th is a sponsored (or just for fun) walk around the City of London's one square mile of amazingly interesting churches. All are welcome. Also during this month the Young Church are having their Talent Show on Sunday 10th May at 4 p.m. in the Hall. The proceeds are to go to Teddington Memorial Hospital's new chapel. Then of course, Jubilee 2000 is placing a human chain around Birmingham on Saturday May 16th for the G8 Summit of World leaders, a chain to break the chains of unpayable debt owed by the world's most impoverished countries. You could be part of it!

Yes, May provides ample opportunity to practise what we preach and to preach what we practise. Mission Statements are very common these days, every enterprise and business seems to have one. Unusually perhaps, St John's Gospel has its mission statement right at the end of the work; after the stories of the resurrection. St. John's Gospel makes it clear that the purpose of having recorded all this Good News about Jesus of Nazareth was not to create a biography, or to preserve a history, but rather in order

'that the world might believe'

That, surely, is our aim, just as much in what we say as in what we do, 'that the world might believe' that God's undying, unquenchable love matters above all else, and that we are called to share it in every part of human life, in what we practise just as much as in what we preach.

If you are willing to help, please let Brian or one of the churchwardens know.



£200 A DAY

That is how much it costs to run the parish of St. James. Staggering, isn't it! Thank God that planned giving through Stewardship and the tax refund we get from covenants amounts to £150 per day. Without that regular support from 100 or so of the congregation at St. James's, the gap would be too big to bridge. We have managed so far to bridge it every year through fund raising, plate collections and hall letting fees. But costs are always increasing - and it is planned giving which gives us confidence for the future.

The graph below shows how giving has increased over the last couple of years, but at a slower rate than we had planned - and needed.

This year we need an additional £3,650 through Stewardship - £10 per day - to make sure we have enough income to cover our expected additional expenditure, such as increased gas and electricity bills, increased wages and pension contributions for the clergy and a fairer share of the diocese costs. If you are in Stewardship, can you increase your giving? Any amount would help. If you are not yet in Stewardship, can you make this the year you join? At any level. And covenanting increases the value of your donation by a quarter.

People's Summit


At the same time as the G8 summit is meeting, an alternative event called the People's Summit will take place, including the following events:

An ecumenical service to remember those suffering because of international debt and to call on God's help to strengthen our campaign for justice.



People's tribunal

An opportunity to hear an alternative view from economists, aid agencies and grassroots campaigners.

Make a chain, to break the chains of debt

At 2 p.m. we will be calling on people to make a giant human chain encircling the G8 summit at the International Conference Centre (ICC) in central Birmingham. The chain will remain in place until representatives from eight indebted countries are able to present a petition to the G8 summit.

To do this will need thousands of people, but to succeed would be big news and win the campaign lots of press coverage. So please bring as many people as you can.
