There is certainly something deeply satisfying about the changing of the seasons. For me there is great relief that the grass stops growing at this time of year, and I am excused from feeling guilty about the state of the Vicarage garden. November comes with the innate quality of looking back on the year that is almost gone. The central heating is back on, the leaves have fallen, the calendar is almost over for this year - time to buy another diary. Those pointers to the ending of the year are very clear. If we add to these both Guy Fawkes Day with its "remember, remember", and Remembrance Sunday, then our sense of looking back seems even more acute during this month.

How many people look back to "Guy Fawkes" and see nothing much - apart from memories of their own childhood bonfires and "Penny for the Guy"? Of course it is important to have such memories, for they communicate our common story to future generations. The danger is that this looking back becomes unreal, if we allow it to be detached from the reasons for the celebration. How often do we look back on Guy Fawkes Day and think of the religious and political hatred which tore our land apart in the 16th and 17th Centuries? Do we dare look back and face the treachery, the violence, the criminal justice system of the day? If we do, we may get a rather nasty shock. Equally, Remembrance Sunday is an important day in our society's year if it forces us to think about the scandal and carnage of war. We have grown accustomed to thinking primarily about the combatants in the First and Second World Wars - but our looking back on Remembrance Sunday must go far beyond this. We have a duty to remember the total human cost of warfare, not only in the two world wars but in every conflict throughout the world - not only where our own country is a combatant party, but also where our country is supplying the technology of war.

In both cases, looking back can only be the beginning. Yes, we do need to remember - but we need to remember in order to change. We need to know how we have become as we are, if we are to change into the children of God which we are called to be. In fact we remember in every Eucharist. The prayer of consecration of the Bread and Wine quotes Jesus' words -

"Do this in remembrance of me."

Yes, we look back to Jesus living, dying and rising to new life - but that isn't enough. Think again about that word remember. It is made up of two parts re-member; that is, put back together again. To remember is to put the constituent parts, or members, into a new relationship. So remembrance is about re-shaping, re-conciling, re-forming, re-creating on every level ourselves, our community, our family, our world.

If remembering is only looking back, then we have only just begun - the hardest part is yet to come. Yes, we remember - but that means both looking back (critically, openly and carefully) and it also means looking forwards by reshaping our lives - not least every time we eat the bread and drink the "wine in remembrance of me".



We have now been in existence for one year and are a fully registered company. Over the last year we have grown from just six girls to a full company of twenty Guides divided into three patrols.

Having enjoyed a very successful first company camp at Heyswood in September we are now busy fund raising in order to buy some of our own equipment. The termly cake sales after Sunday Service are a valuable contribution to this, so please give us your support.



Parish Child Protection Policy

On 13th September, the PCC agreed and adopted the following policy on child protection. The policy was drafted by Jane Newman, our Children's Advocate, in line with the London Diocese Child Protection Guidelines and in consultation with those who run our Sunday School and Young Church..

We commit purselves to nurture, project and safeguard all our members, particularly our children and young people. We welcome and value the varied contributions made to our parish by our children and young people, and recognise their right to find and express their faith in their own way. We recognise that our work with children and soung people is the responsibility of the whole church community. We accept and endorse the principles of the Children's Act 1989 and the House of Bishops' Policy Statement 1999. We undertake to exercise proper care in both the selection and appointment, and the support, of those working with children, whether paid or volunteer. We support parents and carers who have responsibility for bringing up children. We have appointed Jane Newman as our Children's Advocate, as described in the London Diocese Child Protection Guidelines. A copy of the London Diocese Child Protection Guidelines is held by Jane Newman The PCC shall review this policy annually.
